Feedback Obtained
<p>The IQAC has successfully institutionalized students' feedback on teachers and courses in each semester w.e.f. academic session 2010 on a 4-point scale of 10 parameters for teachers and 5 for courses taught. The IQAC has been regularly conducting semester wise student feedback on faculty and courses taught since the academic session of July-December 2010. The feedback forms are prepared in accordance with the NAAC sample format. To achieve maximum feedback and to involve all the students, the exercise is conducted prior to the commencement of the end semester examinations. The students' attendance is mandatory. After compilation, the feedback is disseminated with the approval of Vice-Chancellor, to individual teachers on a confidential basis and feedback on courses to HODs to be shared at the departmental level and to formulate remedial measures on the courses where deemed necessary. Teachers with low grades are invited for justification towards the same by the Vice-Chancellor. The IQAC has been successfully implementing Student Mentoring, Student Counseling, Parent-Teacher Interface in all academic departments, and it is instrumental in the establishment of the Alumni Association. Most of the departments have been obtaining feedback from the employers about the students of the university who have been working with them.</p>

2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

Mizoram University has eight schools under different disciplines and 33 departments. At the time of report all departments, save one, namely Department of Extension Education and Rural Department have student intake at the undergraduate/postgraduate levels. Mentoring is conducted in an extremely significant manner across all departments. The faculty members are in charge of students of each semester and on an average the university mentoring programme would be at the ratio of 1:10 per semester. Mentoring is conducted every semester between each mentor and mentee. However, if the necessity arises, then mentor and mentee may meet as per required frequency. The mentors are provided with a log book wherein details of each mentee are recorded in detail, starting with basics such as regular details on identification, familial details, background check details on academic record, hobbies and aspects related to their aim in life and reasons for the pursuit of the current programme. The role of the teacher mentor is extremely important in this regard. Emphasis is placed upon faculty across the university to provide essential ongoing support, training and advising to their student mentees. Stress is laid upon the fact that they have to identify opportunities to engage students and at times alumni and troubleshoot issues. A certain sense of compatibility and maturity on the part of the mentor is also emphasised upon in order to ensure that differing personalities are kept in mind and in order that they make ongoing adjustments in order to keep the program thriving. In the mentoring programme emphasis is laid upon mentor-mentee inter relationship, especially while tracking the progress of the mentee by the mentor. What is of vital importance is the fact that levels of communication have to be adequately bolstered in order to help the program run smoothly. The mentoring programme conducted in the university has produced significant results. It has succeeded in facilitating individual student learning and growth. This has largely been due to the fact that mentors have identified areas that require flexibility even within the various programmes and have built them in, within the aspect of mentoring. The university has made room for an element of flexibility into the aforementioned programme and students and at times alumni are allowed more flexibility in scheduling, towards mentoring. This has ensured the building of stronger relationships and open communication. Mentoring usually takes place within the department itself but the flexibility to conduct them in less formal settings have worked equally well. Most, if not all students may need additional support to prepare them for the working world and mentorship conducted in the university has had the power to impact the course of the mentees academic and personal life trajectories. The target focus related to goal setting, adaptability, and reflection of mentee sensibility have inculcated a unique opportunity in students to help open doors to future academic and career possibilities. The mentoring system conducted in Mizoram university has facilitated in connecting the bridge between the academic and personal lives of the mentees and has thus helped them to make sense of their future goals.

CRITERION VI – GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

6.1 – Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 – Mention two practices of decentralization and participative management during the last year (maximum 500 words)

1) Mizoram University promotes the culture of participative management through wide ranged representation in the decision-making organs. All Heads of the Academic Departments, all Deans of the Schools, members of students' councils and all Professors are the ex-officio members of the University Court and Academic Council. There are nominees of the State Government, state representatives and nominees of the constituent and affiliated colleges in the Academic Council. Four Deans on rotation, senior-most Professor and senior-most Associate Professor are members of the Executive Council along with the representatives of the State Government and constituent and affiliated colleges. Representation of teachers and of the State Government has also been ensured in the Finance Committee and the Building Committee. Deans of Schools are also members of the University Central Purchase Committee by rotation. 2) The academic activities of the university are mostly decentralized and administered at the departmental procedure level by following the practice of participative management. The admission, revision of syllabus, sharing of administrative responsibilities, conduct of examinations and other related responsibilities are carried out by the departments through a system of consultation and participation by the faculty members. Teachers play active role in the governance of the university through their participation in various decision making bodies at various levels and capacities e.g., the Executive Council, Academic Council, Mizoram University Court, School Board, Board of Studies and non-statutory committees. Similarly, under the Mizoram University Statutes, the students' council representatives also take active part in the Academic Council and in providing useful contributions towards the decision-making process.

6.2.1 – Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following (with in 100 words each):

Strategy Type	Details
Admission of Students	Admissions are invited from all students across the country and abroad through newspaper, websites and social

networking platforms. Online admissions portal had been in use since 2015 for the convenience of applicants. Admission Helpdesks are opened in selected places in the state capital and students volunteer provide free assistance to applicants in online submission of the form. The university strictly follows reservation policy for admission as per stipulations laid down by UGC/GoI.

Industry Interaction / Collaboration

The university has established the Innovation Cell which provides a platform to bring research Innovation and Technology Development to the start-up. It is instrumental in the establishment of a few start-ups. The department of Horticulture, Aromatic and Medicinal Plants (HAMP) has started a small scale start-up on Agro Foods in the department. BioNest Incubator, ALR VSLI Lab are in place. The university has taken a policy decision to have at least one member in the Board of Studies and the School Board from the industry. This would enable academia-industry interactions and ultimately lead to technology development and enhance technology transfer.

Human Resource Management

Utilizing the services of Human Resource Development Centre (HRDC) and Faculty Development Centre (FDC) of the university, professional skill development programmes have been conducted regularly for both teaching and non-teaching employees. Experts from outside the university such as Administrative Training Institute (Govt. of Mizoram) were also invited for in-house training of administrative staff in order to enhance the competency. Utmost care has been taken by the administration in posting supporting staff in the department/section where he/she could render service most efficiently and competently. To ascertain the strength and weakness of each employee, pen picture of the reporting officer upon the employee in APAR is effectively used.

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation

The university has 173 classrooms out of which 152 classrooms are equipped with ICT, digital projection and 1 Gbps LAN facilities. The campus is Wifi enabled. The academic departments are provided with uninterrupted power

supply and good solar power back up generators in all the schools and administrative offices. Street lights are powered by solar energy. CCTV surveillance systems have been installed in selected places for better security provision. E-journals access is provided to all the departments via campus LAN. There are 25 departmental libraries. There are around 98 state-of-the-art laboratories equipped with high end instruments for research and academic activities. There are 19 seminar halls across the university that are used to facilitate conferences, seminars and meetings. The Central Library has over 1,07,000 books and 13,188 bound volumes of journals. It subscribes to 219 journals, 41 general periodicals and 20 dailies. The resources have been enriched further by e-resources that are provided by INFLIBNET Centre through e-ShodhSindhu consortia, that provide 7,506 number of e-journals from 22 publishers.

Research and Development

The university has good research facilities for scholars and faculty members. Central Instrumentation Lab is a specialized research facility which houses 15 sophisticated state-of-the-art instruments with other supporting/basic facilities. Research is being carried out in State Biotech Hub and DBT-Bioinformatics facility of the university. International Students Centre and Collaborations (ISCC) has been set up in order to foster international collaborations with reputed universities and institutions abroad to enhance joint research projects. It also facilitates faculty and student development and exchange, joint programs like workshops and seminars.

Curriculum Development

The university follows a systematic process in the design and development of the curriculum in order to make it relevant to the local, regional and national needs. The need assessment of the revision of PG and UG programmes is an in-built mechanism in the University Ordinances and Regulations. The faculty of its affiliated colleges are also involved in the revision/updating of its PG and UG curricula. The faculty members of the university keep track of new developments in their respective

fields of teaching and research through the journals of repute, formal and informal interactions with faculty of other Universities in the country and abroad. The external members of the statutory academic bodies also provide their inputs while formulating/updating the curriculum. The model syllabi designed by regulatory bodies such as UGC, NCTE and AICTE are given due consideration. Most importantly, the syllabi revision/updating is given due consideration in terms of feedback provided by the students, alumni, employees and parents on a regular basis.

Teaching and Learning

Participatory and collaborative learning strategies like pair and group assignments, presentations, class discussions, and panel discussions are the mode of learning in almost all the departments. Students work together in small groups while analyzing the latest research articles in their field in the library. Students are also required to be actively involved and they facilitate in seminars, symposia, conferences and workshops organized by their respective departments. Experiential learning is a regular mode of learning where students, during their fieldwork and excursions, learn through observation and interaction. Students are also required to reflect upon experiential learning through written forms or workshops and seminars. They also participate in various extra-curricular activities in the campus and outside.

Examination and Evaluation

With the implementation of the CBCS since 2013, examination procedures in the university has been upgraded. The evaluation system incorporating the use of IT ensured transparency, confidentiality and efficiency. The office of the Controller of Examinations has sufficient human resource and technical support that ensures the autonomy of its functions. End-semester examinations are centralized and all security concerns are addressed. Pre-Examination processes (preparation of exam roll sheets etc.), result processing, result publications, issue of grade card are automated. Faculty members are allowed to enter marks into the system through

campus network. Re-evaluation is permitted only for C3 component (End semester examination).

The Finance Department ensures timely submission of UC/SE to the UGC, compilation of annual accounts, auditing of annual accounts and submission of audited annual accounts to MHRD, Govt. of India. 4. The Finance Department of the university maintains and monitors the accounts of all research projects/ schemes sanctioned to the faculty and students. It also ensures timely submission of audited Utilization Certificates for every project as per requirement of funding agencies. 5. Annual accounts of the university are audited by the office of the Accountant General, Aizawl. Audited annual accounts and audit report, after discussion in the Finance Committee, Executive Council and University Court, are submitted to the MHRD, Govt. of India before it is presented to the Parliament. 6. The Finance Department ensures that the stock registers of buildings, land, furniture and equipment are updated and maintained. It keeps a record of equipment and other consumable materials that are maintained in all offices, Special Centres, Specialized Laboratories, and Constituent College and Institutions as maintained by the University. 7. Annual accounts have been regularly audited by the AG office.

7.2 – Best Practices

7.2.1 – Describe at least two institutional best practices

Best Practice ONE : National Academic Depository (NAD)

1. Title of the Practice: The National Academic Depository (NAD) is a 24x7 online store house of all academic awards viz. certificates, diplomas, degrees, mark-sheets etc. which is duly digitized and lodged by academic institutions/boards/eligibility assessment bodies.

2. Objectives of the Practice: NAD not only ensures easy access and retrieval of academic awards but also validates and guarantees its authenticity and safe storage. It further helps in the elimination of fraudulent practices such as forging of certificates and mark-sheets.

3. The Context: The UGC has been designated as the authorized body to operationalize NAD. The Academic Awards to be lodged on NAD cover degrees, diplomas, certificates, mark-sheets including awards issued for skill development. NAD comprises of two interoperable digital depositories viz., NADL Database Management Limited (NDML) and CDSL Ventures Limited (CVL).

4. The Practice: Mizoram University has joined the national endeavor of NAD through the NADL, Mumbai has Degrees/Certificates of MZU are uploaded to the NAD portal. Mizoram University has created awareness about NAD among students through various means by publishing aspects about the same in a national newspaper, The Indian Express and also in local newspapers, Vangliani and The Zozam Times and by publicizing the same in AIR Aizawl and local television Zonet and LPS. Further, the university has created a web portal in this regard to enable the students to register for the same. Mizoram University has entered into a Service Level Agreement (SLA) with NADL, Mumbai to provide National Academic Depository (NAD) as "Digital Initiatives for Higher Education".

5. Evidence of Success: MZU is one among few Universities in the country which has achieved the distinction of practicing this policy initiative of Govt. of India. The students as well as other stakeholders such as the employers find it convenient to verify the degree certificates online. The students can now obtain digital documents such as mark-sheet and pass certificate from this portal.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required: As NAD is an important initiative of Government of India facilitated by Ministry of Education, Mizoram University is able to obtain required technical support in encountering the challenges.

7. Notes: The university has adopted 100 National Academic Depository System on campus and in its affiliated colleges.

Best Practice TWO : Computerized Accounting System

1. Title of the Practice: Digital Accounting System

2. Objectives of the Practice: To enhance the efficiency of administrative/academic work and to provide better services to the stakeholders of Mizoram University.

3. The Context: The maintenance of accounts in the university was a challenging task. With the introduction of accrual system of accounting, the university administration introduced automation through digital platform which offers an accurate and speedy delivery of the entire process from seeking concurrence to the actual passing of bill while capturing transaction in every detail.

4. The Practice:

Mizoram University has switched over to the Accrual System of Accounting and it has been successfully implemented. The office automation system provides speedy financial concurrence for all proposed expenditure vis-à-vis fund positions in the current head/allocation. All bill details, mode and details of transaction are captured live by the system. 5. Evidence of Success: The introduction of computerized accounting system has not only reduced paperwork but has also minimized the number of staff manning the finance department. Not a single case has been moved or nor has transaction been processed outside the purview of the system of automation since its inception. Further, the compilation of the annual accounts has become convenient. Gross error are not committed on the part of university. 6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required: The university has not experienced any major problem. 7. Notes: 100 digital accounting system is practiced by the university.

7.3 – Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 – Provide the details of the performance of the institution in one area distinctive to its vision, priority and thrust in not more than 500 words

Mizoram University, though only 17 years old, is an important center for higher education in this remotely located state of Mizoram. It has made considerable progress in terms of quality, physical infrastructure, manpower and academic programmes. The following are some of the notable performances distinctive to its vision, priority and thrust areas: Regular Conduct of Convocation: The university has the distinction of conducting convocations regularly since its inception. It has conducted 13 convocations in a span of 15 years. Some of the eminent personalities who have delivered the convocation address include: Dr. APJ Abdul Kalam, Smt. Pratibha Patil and Shri Pranab Mukherjee in their capacity as President of India and Visitor of the university. Incubation Centres The university has a well placed Incubation Centre that provides a suitable platform to incubate several startups which has distinctly helped in the socio-economic development of the society. It has established the Defence Research and Development Organization (DRDO), Govt. of India, New Delhi sponsored North East Science Technology Center (NESTC). The center facilitates the research activities in the region and enhances the role of academic institutions in nation building. Voluntary Blood/Organ Donation: The students' council of Mizoram University organises a Voluntary Blood Donation camp every year on campus in collaboration with the Red Ribbon Club (RRC) and National Service Scheme (NSS). The blood donation camp organized on October 18th, 2018 had more than 200 donors while 6 departments reported 100 attendance. The Vice Chancellor of the university also donated blood on this occasion. The Department of Social Work had organized the Organ Donation Campaign in collaboration with Zuble Foundation, Guwahati on October 10, 2018. Out of 70 student participants, 50 consented to donate their organs. Tlawmngaihna (Service to Humanity) on the Campus: Mizo students are actively involved in rendering service to the community as part of Tlawmngaihna (Service to Humanity). Mizo ethos and values are reflected in the campus life and the students are known for extending their feelings of warmth and hospitality to their fellow students. The university has achieved the distinction of being a 'ragging free' campus. The girl students or female staff in the campus are not subject to eve teasing. There is virtually no internal complaint lodged during the period. Organizing 'Virthli' a Festival of the University: The Students' Council organizes an annual festival for 5 days viz., 'Virthli'. It is a festival as well as a competition on different indoor and outdoor activities. The Students' Council mobilizes and ensures participation of the students in

various activities. The festival also includes motivational speeches and awareness generation on themes such as - HIV/AIDS Awareness, Road Safety Awareness and Environmental Protection. The Virthli provides the platform for showcasing the heritage of rich and diverse culture of North east India, in terms of the costumes, ethnic food and customs. This helps in providing the harmony among the students studying in the university.

8.Future Plans of Actions for Next Academic Year

Mizoram University has greater academic and skill based educational plans for the students in this remote part of the country. The students in this part of country do not have adequate exposure of skill-based quality education which could ensure more employment for the students. The place is devoid of major or minor industries and it is bereft of adequate MSME support from the Govt. of India. Therefore, the university has greater plans for vertical and horizontal expansions of the academic programs in terms of addressing these important issues. It has the vision of opening important academic programs viz., Food Technology, Industrial Chemistry, Tourism and Hospitality Management, Clinical Psychology and several skill development programs. These programs shall enable the graduates to participate in the overall development of the state. Further, the university is consistently securing high NIRF Ranking (within 100) and has secured NAAC accreditation with Grade 'A'. It seeks to open several online academic programs which could ensure global visibility. The master programs viz., e-management, e-commerce, e-business are eventually useful in providing job opportunities to the graduates. The second future plan of Mizoram University is the extension of laboratory research to the field which could facilitate the society for adopting the newer technologies for overall development and growth of the country. The Incubation Centers shall take the lead to address this aspect. The Massive Online Open Courses (MOOC) is to be introduced to a greater extent in order to provide the quality education to a larger section of society. This, along with the open programs could eventually enhance the GER (Gross Enrolment Ratio) of the country. Mizoram has the advantage of literacy (second in country), which needs to be transformed into quality/employable higher education. The university plans to extend viable higher education to everyone in this part of country either offline or online mode. Mizoram shares geographical boundaries with two countries viz., Bangladesh and Myanmar. This could render advantage in facilitating a greater exchange of students and provide technological/consultancy support to other country. Cultural heritage of the Mizoram and various ethnic groups can be preserved by opening a heritage centre at Mizoram University.
