ENG-501: Research Methodology: 4 credits

ENG-502: Research and Publication Ethics: 2 credits

Course Objectives: This course has been incorporated in accordance to UGC notification

,No.F.1-1/2018 (Journal/CARE) Dated Dec. 2019. The two credit course has been madecompulsory in order to create awareness about publication ethics and publication misconduct.

Course Outcomes: The course is expected to prepare researchers on the basics of philosophy of science and ethics, research integrity, publication ethics. Hands-on-session are designed to identify research misconduct and predatory publications. Indexing and citation databases, open access publications, research metrics (citation, h-index, Impact Factor, etc.) and plagiarism tools will be introduced in this course.

Course content: The course comprises of 6 modules with each having 4-5 units: **Theory:**

- 1. Philosophy and Ethics:
 - a. Introduction to philosophy: definition, nature and scope, concept, branches.
 - b. Ethics: definition, moral philosophy, nature of moral judgments and reactions.
- 2. Scientific conduct:
 - a. Ethics with respect to science and research.
 - b. Intellectual honesty and research integrity.
 - c. Scientific misconducts, Falsification, Fabrication and Plagiarism (FFP).
 - d. Redundant publications: duplicate and overlapping publications, salami slicing.
 - e. Selective reporting and misrepresentation of data.
- 3. Publication ethics
 - a. Publication ethics: definition, introduction and importance.
 - b. Best practices/ standards setting initiatives and guidelines: COPE, WAME, etc.
 - c. Conflicts of interest.
 - d. Publication misconduct: definition, concept, types and problems that lead to unethical behavior, and vice versa.
 - e. Violation of publication ethics, authorship and contribution ship.
 - f. Identification of publication misconduct, complaints and appeals.

g. Predatory publishers and journals.
